## 2 Normal use

## 2.1 Intended use

#### Camera control units

Camera control units are for use with camera heads or videoscopes and are used for visualizing and documenting endoscopic and microscopic procedures.

Camera control units do not have direct contact with the human body.

#### **Extension cable**

The extension cable is used for extending the camera head cable for connection to the IMAGE1S camera control unit.

The extension cable has no direct contact with the human body.

## 2.2 Indications

#### **Camera Control Units**

The camera control units do not come into direct contact with the patient; instead, they are used in conjunction with the corresponding accessories (videoscopes, camera, light source, and monitor) and the applied parts for the purpose of visualizing and documenting endoscopic and exoscopic procedures. Use is not restricted to certain medical disciplines.

#### **Extension cable**

Not applicable as there is no direct or indirect patient contact and the products considered have no clinical application.

## 2.3 Contraindications

No contraindications relating directly to the medical device are currently known. The responsible physician must decide whether the foreseen application is admissible based on the general condition of the patient.

## 2.4 Clinical benefits

The products support the presenting of important and crucial anatomic structures during the surgical procedure, permitting the endoscopic investigation and the performance of endoscopic procedures in minimally invasive surgery.

## 2.5 Residual risks

No residual risks directly related to the product were identified.

## 2.6 Target user populations

The medical device may only be used by doctors and medical assistants with a relevant specialist qualification.

## 2.7 Patient population

There are no restrictions in terms of patient groups for this product.



## 3 Safety and warning

#### A WARNING

#### Danger due to non-observance of warnings and safety notes

This chapter contains warnings and safety notes structured according to hazards and risks.

## 3.1 Serious incidents

A 'serious incident' includes incidents which, directly or indirectly, had, could have had or could have any of the following consequences:

- Death of a patient, user, or another person
- Temporary or permanent serious deterioration in the medical condition of a patient, user, or another person
- A serious threat to public health
- ► The manufacturer and appropriate authority must be notified of all serious incidents.

## 3.2 Combination with other components

The use of unauthorized devices and components or unauthorized changes to the product can result in injuries.

- Ensure that any additional devices connected to electrical medical devices comply with the relevant IEC or ISO standards.
- ► Ensure that all configurations comply with the requirements for medical electrical systems.
- Only combine the product with devices and components that the manufacturer has approved for combined use, see chapter *Possible combinations*.
- Only use devices and components that have standardized interfaces and do not breach the normal use of the product.
- ▶ Do not modify this equipment without authorization of the manufacturer.
- ▶ Do not use multiple socket outlets with this device.
- ► If the use of a multiple socket outlet cannot be avoided: Only use a multiple socket outlet with an isolation transformer in accordance with IEC 60601-1.

## 3.3 Product not clean

The product is not clean when delivered. The use of products that have not been cleaned poses a risk of infection for patients, users, and third parties.

 Reprocess the product in line with the reprocessing instructions before initial use and every subsequent use.

## 3.4 Dangers from electrical current

An improper power supply may cause an electric shock and injure patients, users, or third parties. All electrical installations in the operating room in which the product is connected and used must meet all applicable IEC standards.

- > Do not touch the output jacks of the product and the patient at the same time during use
- ► Do not open the product.
- ► Use either the power cord supplied by KARL STORZ or a power cord which has the same properties and which bears a national mark of conformity.



- ▶ Make sure that the plug is completely clean and dry.
- ▶ Do not use more than one extension cable.
- > The product's ground line should be installed by a qualified electrician.
- ▶ Ensure potential equalization according to the applicable national rules and regulations.
- ► To ensure reliable protective earth grounding, connect the product to a properly installed socket that is approved for use in the operation room. Routinely inspect the electrical plug and cord and do not use if the inspection reveals damage.
- To avoid the risk of electric shock, this product must only be connected to a supply mains with protective earth.

If several products supplied with energy are used simultaneously, the patient leakage currents accumulate. These leakage currents can exceed the limit values and injure patients.

▶ The patient applied parts of the simultaneously used products must be type BF or type CF.

## 3.5 Damage due to ingress of liquid in electrical components

In the case of electrical products, individual components or the product itself may be live. Liquid ingress into an electrical product may result in a short circuit or an unintentional transfer of current. The product is damaged as a result and patients, users and third parties may be injured.

- ▶ Do not store liquids near the product or on the product.
- ▶ If liquid has entered the product, pull out the plug and allow the product to dry completely.

## 3.6 Risk of explosion and fire

The product can generate sparks, which cause combustible or flammable gases and liquids to ignite or explode. This may cause injuries to patients, users, and third parties.

▶ When using explosive narcotic gases: Operate the product outside of the hazard zone.



- ▶ Do not use the product in the presence of flammable anesthetics.
- ► The product must not be operated in oxygenated environments.
- Only connect or disconnect the power plug to or from the power supply outside explosive atmospheres.

## 3.7 Electromagnetic interference

Medical electrical products are subject to special precautions regarding electromagnetic compatibility and must be installed and commissioned according to the tables on electromagnetic compatibility. If other products (e.g. for MRT, CT, diathermy, electrocautery or RFID) emit electromagnetic radiation, the function of the product may be impaired. High-frequency communication equipment can affect electrical medical products and impair their performance.

During installation and operation of the product, please take note of the information on electromagnetic compatibility, see chapter *Electromagnetic compatibility*.

The discharge of a defibrillator can cause image loss.



▶ If the image has not recovered after 4 seconds, switch the camera control unit off and on again.

## 3.8 Failure of products

The product may fail during use.

- ▶ Perform an equipment test before use, see chapter Preparation [p. 25].
- ► If the image fails during the procedure, remove the camera from the endoscope and continue the procedure optically.
- ► If the surgery cannot be continued optically, determination of how to further the procedure is at the physician's discretion based on the surgical circumstances.
- ► Have a replacement system ready for each application.

## 3.9 Observing ambient condition

If the device is operated in an environment which is not suitable, patients, users and third parties may be injured.

► Always store and operate the product in the prescribed ambient conditions.

- Light Source Control for automatic adjustment of the light source.

## 4.4 Possible combinations

## 5 Preparation

## 5.1 Unpacking the product

- 1. Carefully remove the product and accessories from the packaging.
- 2. Check the delivery for missing items and possible damage.
- 3. In the case of damage, hidden defects, and short deliveries, document their nature and extent and contact the manufacturer or supplier immediately.
- 4. Keep packaging for further transport.

## 5.2 Inspecting the product

- 1. Check the product and the camera head or videoendoscope for external damage.
- 2. Ensure that the camera head cable or videoendoscope cable is not damaged or kinked.
- 3. Point the camera head or the videoendoscope toward an object to check the display quality on the monitor.
- 4. When using 3D videoendoscopes, check to make sure the monitor's display is correct.
- 5. Be sure to use the correct polarized eyewear for the monitor.

## 5.3 Reprocessing the product

▶ Reprocess the product in line with the reprocessing instructions before using it.

## 5.4 Setting up the product

#### A WARNING

#### Blocked air inlets and air outlets! Risk of fire!

If the air inlets and outlets are blocked, the product may overheat. This can cause the product to fail and start a fire. Users, patients, and third parties may be injured.

- ► Remove any blockages in the air inlets and outlets when setting up the product.
- 1. Set the product down on a horizontal, flat surface or in a video cart. Make sure that the power cord can be unplugged at any time.
- 2. Ensure adequate air circulation.
- 3. For best thermal performance, position the product at the top of the device stack.

## 5.5 Connecting the product

1. Connect the potential equalization cable.





- 2. Connect the potential equalization line to the connector of the treatment room.
- 3. Connect the numbered inputs in ascending order.
- 4. Use the LINK cable to connect the LINK module to the CONNECT module.



5. Pull back the protection device of the SCB connector and insert the connector into one of the SCB sockets.



6. Connect the other end of the cable to a KARL STORZ SCB control device (KARL STORZ Communication Bus).



7. Insert the OR1 patch cable into the KS HIVE/LAN interface.



- Connect the other end of the cable to a KS HIVE-compatible product, e.g., Power LED Rubina (TL400), Power LED Saphira (TL410), ARTIP CRUISE (UR500B, UR500C), AIDA (WD300, WD350), OR1 HIVE router (WO10240, WO10307).
- 9. Connect the IMAGE1 S 4U-LINK (TC304) and Power LED Rubina (TL400) to a sync cable if the products are being used with the TIPCAM1 Rubina.
- 10. Connect the monitor. For the IMAGE1 S CONNECT (TC200), connect the primary work screen to DVI 1.



- 11. Ensure that the monitor supports a resolution of 1,920 x 1,080 pixels.
- 12. If the D3-LINK module (TC302) is used in conjunction with a 3D videoendoscope, connect a compatible 3D monitor.



- 13. For the IMAGE1 S CONNECT II (TC201) connect the primary work screen to DP 1.
- 14. Ensure that the monitor supports a resolution of 3,840 x 2,160 pixels.
- 15. Connect the power cord. Push the power plug fully into the power socket.



16. Push the power plugs fully into the power sockets of the LINK modules.



- 17. Connect the power plugs to the power sockets.
- $(\mathbf{i})$  Use the network device only in a protected network with firewall and router.

# 5.6 Putting the product into operation

#### Hot surfaces! Risk of burns!

The surfaces can get hot due to locked ventilation fans or blocked air intakes. There is a possible risk of a burn if touched.

► If the surfaces get hot, switch off the product.

#### A WARNING

#### HF electrodes and laser probes! Risk of injury!

If HF electrodes and laser probes are activated in the instrument channel, the patient may be seriously injured.

 Only apply power to the HF electrodes and laser probe once the active parts have left the instrument channel and are in the user's field of vision, and the site of the operation is clearly recognizable.



#### **A** CAUTION

#### Image and function malfunctions!

Incorrectly connected camera connections can cause image interference and malfunctioning.

- Ensure that the camera connector is always attached properly and securely before starting the procedure.
- 1. Turn the product on using the power switch.



- ⇒ The connected LINK modules start automatically.
- 2. Format the USB storage device as FAT 32.
- 3. Connect the USB storage device to the IMAGE1 S CONNECT to store still images or videos. Do not connect more than 1 USB storage device.



- 4. Check the values set for the primary source and the secondary source.
- 5. Check the layout.
- 6. Insert the camera head connector into the socket of the relevant LINK module.







## 5.7 Performing the white balance

- (1) The white balance must be performed again after replacing the endoscope.
- $(\mathbf{i})$  Failure to perform proper white balance of system may result in color distortion.
- 1. Ensure that the imaging instrument is connected and a live image appears on the monitor.
- 2. Connect the light source to the imaging instrument via the light cable.
- 3. Point the tip of the imaging instrument at a white and clean surface, e.g., white gauze.
- 4. Make sure that the light source emits enough light to sufficiently illuminate the surface.
   ⇒ The monitor displays a completely white and well illuminated live image.
- 5. Press the White Balance button on the IMAGE 1 CONNECT or the button in the Live menu.
   ⇒ The white balance is performed.
- 6. Check the monitor to see whether the white balance was successful.
- 7. Repeat the white balance if required.



## 6 Application

## 6.1 Dashboard

The dashboard displays the LINK modules, peripheral devices, and recommended accessories connected to the LINK module. Unconnected peripheral devices, recommended accessories, and the LINK modules are shown in gray.

If more than one LINK module is used, the IMAGE1 S with the Auto Source Detection function automatically recognizes the module to which a camera head is connected. Provided that the secondary source is configured with *None* or S-Technologies. If the secondary source is configured with a LINK module, the IMAGE1 S behaves according to the configuration.

Depending on the configuration, individual icons may be deactivated or unavailable. The configuration can be changed in the Setup menu, see chapter *Setup menu* [p. 37].



The dashboard is shown when no camera head or videoendoscope is connected.

- 1. Tap the **Display** button.
- 2. Set the primary source, secondary source, PiP layout, and grid.
- 3. Tap the **Insufflator** button.
- 4. In the Insufflator menu, adjust the settings for gas, flow, and pressure.
- 5. Tap the Light Source button.
- 6. Turn the light source on or off and set the light intensity and the mode.
  - ⇒ If two or more light sources, camera heads, videoendoscopes are connected at the same time, no light source settings can be made. Exception: The light source tile remains active if one OPAL1-compatible and one non OPAL1-compatible camera head are used.
- 7. Tap the **Printer** button.
- 8. The number of images per page and the number of copies can be set in the **Printer** menu.
- 9. On the **Storage/Eject** button, read off the amount of used storage space on the connected USB storage device.



- 10. Tap the **Storage/Eject** button to eject the USB storage device. Data may be lost if the USB storage device is not ejected.
  - $\, \Rightarrow \,$  The USB storage device can be removed.
- 11. Tap the **Presets** button.
- 12. If presets have been defined in the Setup menu, select a preset.
- 13. Tap the **Setup** button to open the Setup menu. Alternatively, you can press the SHIFT+ENTER keys.
- 14. Tap the Info button to see contact information.
- 15. Tap the Patient button.
- 16. Create, select, modify, or delete a patient information record. Up to 50 patient information records can be created.

## 6.2 Live menu

The Live menu allows you to choose between different camera functions and change the settings of connected devices. Unconnected devices are shown in gray.

The Live menu can be opened using the following keys/buttons:

- The Enter key on the keyboard.
- The menu button on the camera head or videoendoscope.
- The left side button on the IMAGE1 PILOT.
- (i) Be sure not to touch the 3D wheel or the buttons while the IMAGE1 PILOT is connecting to the IMAGE1 CONNECT.



- 1. Tap the Brightness button to set the brightness of the LINK module.

- IMAGE1 S CONNECT II (TC201) and a 4U-LINK in combination with 4U camera heads (TH120 or TH121)
- IMAGE1 S CONNECT (TC200) or IMAGE1 S CONNECT II (TC201) and a D3-LINK in combination with a 4 mm TIPCAM1 S 3D

Interfering artifacts are reduced, such as the moiré effect or the display of the fiberscope grid. Filter A is suitable if the honeycombed grid structures are small. Filter B is suitable for larger honeycomb structures; for example, when an optical zoom is used.
